

WHAT TO EXPECT

After a COVID-19 Vaccination - Single dose (Johnson & Johnson)

A COVID-19 vaccine will help protect you from getting COVID-19. Here you find information about what to expect after getting the single-dose Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine.



Common Side Effects:

You may feel some side effects after getting the vaccine. This is a normal sign that your body is building protection. They should go away after a few days.

On the arm where you got the shot:

- Pain
- Swelling
- Redness

Throughout the rest of your body:

- Headache
- Feeling very tired
- Muscle aches
- Nausea
- Fever

If you get a COVID-19 vaccine and you think you might be having a severe allergic reaction after leaving the vaccination site, seek immediate medical care by calling 911.



Helpful Tips:

If you have pain or discomfort, talk to your doctor about taking an over-the-counter medicine, such as ibuprofen or acetaminophen. Taking these medications after you get the vaccine will not reduce its effectiveness.

To reduce pain and discomfort where you got the shot:

- Apply a clean, cool, wet washcloth over the area
- Use or exercise your arm

To reduce discomfort from fever:

- Drink plenty of fluids
- Dress lightly





When to call your doctor:

- If the redness or tenderness where you got the shot increases after 24 hours
- If your side effects are worrying you or don't seem to be going away after a few days
- If you have any questions or concerns



Remember:

- **When you receive your shot**, you will get a vaccination card to document the name of the vaccine and date of when you received the vaccine. Keep this card in a safe place.
- **It takes time for your body to build protection after any vaccination.** COVID-19 vaccines may not protect you until 2 to 4 weeks after your shot.
- **To help stop the pandemic you should continue to:**
 - Cover your nose and mouth with a mask
 - Avoid close contact with others outside your household
 - Wash hands often
 - Clean and disinfect surfaces
