

MYTHS VS FACTS FOR THE FLU

MYTH: The vaccine can cause the flu.

FACT

The flu vaccine does not have any flu virus in it and cannot cause flu illness. If you feel achy or slightly feverish, it is a normal reaction of the immune system to the vaccine and generally lasts only a day or two.

MYTH: I got the flu after getting the vaccine — the shot does not work.

FACT

After your flu shot, it takes about 2 weeks for full effect. During this time, you're still vulnerable to becoming ill with the flu. Getting your flu vaccine before flu season can make for milder symptoms if you do get sick. To keep from spreading the flu, wash your hands often or use hand sanitizer. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth. Try not to be around others who are sick.

MYTH: I never get the flu, so I don't need a flu shot.

FACT

If you haven't gotten the flu in the past, that doesn't mean you won't catch it this year. Millions of people have never gotten into a car accident but still wear a seat belt. Getting a flu shot is an important step to protect yourself and stay healthy.
